Situated on the Atlantic coast, all 13 miles of the island's pristine quartz beaches are open for enjoyment. Visitors can explore the island's natural wonders along scenic trails at Fort Clinch State Park, Amelia Island State Park, Egans Creek Greenway, and The Gateway to the Great Florida Birding Trail, with a chance to see more than 100 bird species. Scenic shorelines and winding waterways reveal an amazing assortment of native wildlife and breathtaking vistas.

- In November, the Right Whale Festival celebrates the annual return of the endangered North Atlantic Right Whale to the destination's warm coastal waters with fun, ocean-themed activities and exhibits.

- In addition to tours and rentals, the folks at Amelia Adventures offer exciting 3-day outdoor adventure camps for kids and teens. These immersive celebrations of nature are available June and July.

FEELING BEACHY CLEAN

Amelia Island works hard and prides itself on its clean, beautiful beaches. Visitors love walking the sandy shores of Fernandina Beach, where the only thing left behind are their footprints.

- A local "Leave No Trace" ordinance ensures any unattended items left on the beach after 8 p.m. are removed and discarded daily.
- Visitors are asked to kindly fill in holes and sandcastles that can be dangerous for sea turtles and other wildlife that call Amelia Island home.
- Keep Nassau Beautiful, Inc. coordinates local partners and volunteers for ongoing cleanup projects such as the annual "Downtown to Dunes" to keep Amelia's beaches spotless.
- To help protect and preserve the island's natural assets, Amelia Island conducts critical beach renourishment, ensuring plenty of uncrowded, peaceful, quartz sand shoreline for beachgoers all year round.
